EVERY BANK IN CALIFORNIA ORDERED CLOSED

The State Board of Bank Examiners has ordered all the banks in California to remain closed until further orders. Patrons can neither make nor withdraw deposits. The government is preparing to advance and dispatch fifty million dollars to San Francisco banks to relieve the financial situation.

President A. W. Foster of the Cal. Northwestern has offered the use of the Company's wrecking crew and apparatus including the derrick and steam shovel for clearing away the debris and the offer has been accepted.

It has been suggested that a spur track be laid to connect with the electric rails and the wrecker be run down Fourth street and used in handling the heavy pieces. With the steam shovel the bricks and mortar could be rapidly cleared away, and with a number of flat cars this debris could be hauled off expeditiously. The wrecking crew of the electric railroad is already on the scene and at work and from the way things look now in a short time there will be a big difference in the appearance of things.

Three men were killed in the collapse of El Bonita Hotel at Duncan's Mills.

Most of the buildings in Bloomfield went down.

The principal damage at Forestville was to the winery of William Lehn.

W. S. Linsley, night foreman of the Press Democrat, had a miraculous escape. He had to run into the press room in order to reach the side door leading to the street. He had just reached the door when the crash came. The five other employes present were already in the street and were caught by the falling walls. One, Bob Mitchell, a carrier, was soon released. Four perished. Mr. Linsley alone escaped injury. He worked his way out.

The Rev. J. A. Batchelor reports that the limits of the fire in San Francisco are as follows: Everything south of Market street swept clean out to Twenty-second street; north of Market, everything east of Van Ness avenue to the beach; in one or two places fire crossed Van Ness avenue, but was stopped at Franklin street.

The Military Guard will honor passes at the following points only: Headquarters, Fifth and B Sts; Fifth and Mendocino Sts; Fourth and D Sts; Second and Main Sts; Third and B Sts; Third and A Sts; Fourth and Washington; Fifth and A Sts.

Tomorrow morning services will be held by the various churches, either in their edifices or in the lots adjoining. In the afternoon there will be a union service in the old College grounds, in which every church in town will participate.

Inquiry at the Santa Rosa hospital this morning elicited the information that Mrs. J. P. Hessel's injuries are regarded as fatal. Her hip is crushed, and she sustained internal injuries.

The remains of Miss Excelsa, the Novelty actress, and a little girl, identity unknown, were found this morning and taken to the morgue. The body of the latter was taken from the ruins of the Ramona lodging house.

Mrs. W. H. Mallory, whose husband was killed here, is reported to have been killed in San Francisco.
