

Brief Local Notes

Morris Prince set a crew of men to work on Monday morning cleaning off his lot and getting mortar scraped off bricks. Mr. Prince has full confidence in Santa Rosa's prosperity and will rebuild.

George Ullrich is here from San Francisco. Ullrich's place of business there was not damaged. His family spent three nights in an electric car.

Work on J. C. Mailer's new building on the corner of Fifth and Humboldt streets will be rushed. Considerable of the stock of the Mailer Hardware Company has been saved.

William H. Willcox has been appointed Building Inspector. His office is in the new City Hall, and he resides at 850 Third street.

The Head Camp of the Modern Woodmen has donated \$100,000 to the San Francisco victims of the earthquake shock.

The earthquake did considerable damage to the buildings at Fountaingrove, the exact amount of which cannot be estimated yet. In the champagne cellar a cave-in played havoc.

Mrs. Robert P. Hill, President of the State Federation of Women's Clubs, was in Santa Rosa to inquire what the Federation could do to assist.

Glenn Murdock, at the relief headquarters, has charge of the clothing taken from the wreck of the Grand Hotel, and owners may recover same from him upon proof of property.

Mr Crawford arrived here from Chicago on Monday night to ascertain the welfare of his parents, Judge and Mrs R. F. Crawford.

Hundreds of people gather at the depots upon the arrival of each train and eagerly scan the passengers for relatives and friends.

Temporary business locations have been secured by most of the merchants who secured portions of their stock from the wreckage.

The schools will not reopen until next Monday, it is expected.

A man who spoke slightlying to the military here is reported to have been given his deserts in the form of an impromptu cold bath.

The committee of bankers and bank cashiers held another meeting on Monday night to further discuss the financial situation.

An alarm of fire was given Monday night at ten o'clock. The department hurried to upper Fourth street. There was no fire.

A lady named Cline is here from San Francisco making inquiries about her missing son.

A man named Price, who was last seen the night before the earthquake, when he said he was going to spend the night at the Central lodging house, is missing.

There was an attempted burglary at Fountaingrove the night before last, but the burglars were driven off. The place is now well officered.

Hundreds of belated telegrams are being received here daily for Santa Rosans and Sonoma county people.

Lee Brothers & Co. are in receipt of a telegram from the Standard Oil Co., authorizing them to subscribe five thousand dollars to the relief committee here. The telegram is signed by W. S. Miller, secretary of the company. The subscription will be made for the company.

Harriman Helping

Oakland, Apr. 24—E. H. Harriman, president of the Southern Pacific company, accompanied by the heads of several departments, arrived here yesterday. He says the company is preparing to render every assistance in its power, and will transport sick and homeless over any part of the system free of charge.

Palace Hotel Plans

Washington, April 23—Senator Newlands when asked to-day if the Palace Hotel would be rebuilt, said that a building would be erected on the site; but whether it would be a hotel or an office building has not yet been determined.

Electric Lights Tonight

Santa Rosa residences will be supplied with electric lights at once. Danville Decker has a crew of men inspecting residences today, and those that are safe will be provided with electric lights tonight. The inspection may take a couple of days. Where a building is not absolutely safe, no electricity will be permitted. Mr. Decker will be in position to supply fuel gas before it can be turned into the mains, as it will be necessary to remove all the debris from the scene of the business blocks and stop up all the pipes before gas can be turned on.

To Secure Relief

State Controller Edward P. Colgan, Senator Edward F. Woodward, Judge Albert G. Burnett, Walter F. Price, and Arthur B. Swain of Sebastopol, went to Oakland this morning to confer with Governor George C. Pardee relative to assistance for Santa Rosa. It is proposed to divert a portion of tee provisions and money being sent from the east to San Francisco to the devastated district of Santa Rosa. The report of the committee will be awaited with interest.

Was Killed at Agnews

Mr. and Mrs. Leete returned last night with the remains of their daughter who was one of the attendants killed at the Agnews asylum by the earthquake.

Sympathy from Vallejo

Mayor Overton received a message of sympathy from the Mayor of Vallejo in behalf of the citizens, accompanied by inquiries as to whether any assistance is needed.

\$105 For a Cherry

New York, April 23—The first box of California cherries of the season was auctioned here to-day, one cherry at a time, for the benefit of the earthquake sufferers, and brought \$2,440. About 500 berry commission merchants and others attended the sale. The first cherry brought \$105, and the others amounts ranging from \$100 to 50 cents.
